History

The Society was founded in 1971 at Manchester Royal Infirmary as the British Society of Neurosurgical Nurses (BSNN).



In 1974 it became affiliated to the World Federation of Neurosurgical Nurses (now known as Neuroscience Nurses).

It expanded in 1976 to include Neuromedical nurses and thus changed its name to the British Society of Neuromedical & Neurosurgical Nurses (BSNN). The Society had to maintain separate lists of neurosurgical & neuromedical Nurses to comply with affiliation to the WFNN.

The Society became affiliated to the European Association of Neurosurgical Nurses (now known as Neuroscience |Nurses) at the inaugural congress in 1979.

The Society changed its name to the British Association of Neuroscience Nurses in 1998 (BANN).





At the inaugural meeting it was decided that full members would have to have been in neurosciences for at least 2 years & would need 2 sponsors one of which had to be a neurosurgeon & the other a member of the Society. This was in line with the WFNN & continued until 1979.

The first annual subscription was £2.50. The first meeting concluded with an "interesting" talk from a consultant neurosurgeon on the history of neurosurgery. Meetings continued in the Spring & Autumn of each year until 1999 with the autumn meeting having the AGM.

There have been many changes in the NHS & Neurosciences since the inception of BANN and it is only when you start looking back that you remember what you've forgotten! It is not all that long ago that Lumbar Air Encephalograms, Myelograms, Pressure studies for hydrocephalus & Angiograms when they took one x-ray at a time where the norm. Side effects were pretty awful for some patients including violent headaches, vomiting etc.

CT scans were only introduced in the '70's so not every hospital had one & those first scans took two minutes to record one slice! The quality was pretty awful as well so clinical signs, excellent recording and monitoring was essential. Now we have MRI, PET Scans etc & it's hard to imagine how we coped without them.

There were no Brain stem death tests till the 80's & it was not uncommon for patients to linger on ventilators for days on end. Vegetative state patients are fewer in number because of these advances Bolus nasogastric feeding, half hourly observations post craniotomy for 24 hours —then hourly for 24 hours —then 2 hourly for a couple of days —it a wonder anyone survived! Infusion devices mean that drugs are given evenly over time and not as boluses or by drip counting.

Stereotaxy was really 'on the edge' surgery and seen as experimental in Parkinson's' etc & the eccentric surgeons that went with it!

It hasn't just been clinical advances. The committee had to hand write all their documents in the early days & an appeal for a typewriter in October 1977 resulted in a welcome donation from the Walton. Computers came on board in the 1990's enabling records to be transferred & kept up to date

Throughout this time as neuroscience nurses we have adapted and grown being a major part of the team which we still are

Over the 40 years our membership has fluctuated but those members have consistently been active in forwarding practice within Neurosciences as well as voicing their opinions at the highest level

The board and membership are constantly looking at how to promote the speciality e.g. working with NICE, supporting NeuroBlend education project with EANN, full participation in EANN and WFNN Congresses, board members of EANN and being a stakeholder in many of the important milestones highlighted below

We hope you enjoy the trip down memory lane & if you remember any of the above you must have been in Neuro for a long time — well done and aren't your patients lucky!

Milestones


24th November 1971 – BSNN founded

1972 Enrolled Nurses were admitted as Associate members Impact of the Salmon report – the role of Nursina Officer was not being implemented in Neurosurgery as envisaged by the report

1973 First newsletter presented **1974** Affiliation with the SBNS & WFNN

- RCN approached for BSNN to become a specialist group within the RCN – motion defeated at the AGM
- First Society badge produced
- BSNN committee member elected to join a working party to set the curriculum for post registration/post enrolment courses in neuromedical & neurosurgical nursing
- Lucy Hughes working as a Nurse Consultant in Burma for the World Health organisation
- Judith Wills President of the WFNN

1975 European Association of Neurological Surgeons held their meeting in Oxford which members of BSNN attended. BSNN had contacted neurosurgical nurses in Europe to meet in Oxford with the purpose of forming a European Association of Neurosurgical Nurses inaugural meeting was in 1979 in Paris - Newsletter changed to "Headlines" -Phyllis Holt editor.



1976 First weekend meeting due to being held in Edinburgh – social programme first introduced – a precedent was set!



Agreed to admit neuromedical, neuropsychiatry & neurorehabilitation nurses but separate lists of neurosurgical & neuromedical nurses had to be kept to comply with WFNN rules. The majority of the organisation had to be neurosurgical – BSNNN

> - BSNNN became a founder member of the Joint Committee of Professional Nurses, Midwives & Health Visitor Association – giving professional advice directly to the DHSS. Advice was sought on such things as NHS Reforms, UKCC, Standards of Care and the Clinical Role of the nurse. This committee continued until 2001

1977 WFNN Brazil EANN inaugural Congress Paris - Chris Sampson Chairman & Phyllis Holt Secretary



1980 Controversial Panorama programme caused repercussions with organ donation - donor cards were torn up among other things

- Nursing Times offered to produce a twice yearly Association newsletter but not feasible at this time

1981 WFNN Congress Munich







Autumn – first conference where all the papers were presented by nurses or other members of the MDT. Prior to this there had been a heavy medical influence. Indeed one session presented by two Neurosurgeons was entitled "Neurosurgical Nursing"- it would be

interesting to hear what they had to say! 1983 Information booklet for members first printed -**EANN Brussels**

1985 WFNN Toronto – agreed to admit neuromedical nurses - Chris Eberhardie elected editor of publications & Phyllis Holt secretary

Working party set up to set Standards for Neuroscience Nursing with Douglas Allan as chairman – the precursor to Benchmarking BSNN acted as host for the EANN Congress in London – Kate McArdle (nee Newlands elected Treasurer)










1989 WFNN Congress Disneyland California

2010 October 2010 – Marjorie Newsome Awards for

- The SBNS award the Marjorie Newsome prize for the highest mark in the neurosurgeons exams. This is in conjunction with the Barrow Neurological Institute in Phoenix Arizona. This year saw the award being expanded to include neurosurgical nurses. Scholarship awards will be given annually to neurosurgical nurses who apply to BANN & are successful to undertake a project at the BNI in Arizona - Conference Poster & Oral prize became the Bernie Selley prize sponsored by Integra. Although never a committee member Bernie had been a long time member & supporter of BANN

2011 Joint working with SBNS – BANN was approached by the secretary of SBNS to see if we would like free registration for nurses to attend with a neurosurgeon from their own unit. The remainder of the conference fees had to be met by the nurses but as an organisation we welcomed this. Following further council meetings the SBNS decided to open this offer to all AHP's involved in Neurosciences, but I'm pleased that BANN took the initiative & started the negotiations.


